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of evictions on Lord Ventry's property at Bally-
ferriter, where, it will be remembered, on a recent
occasion the people assembled in large numbers
armed with pitchforks and resisted the execu-
tion of the law's decree. A similar disturbance
is anticipated on to-morrow and the succeeding
days, but the authorities, in order to prevent
anything like resistance, have used all the re-
sources at their command to preserve the peace.
Recent events in other districts being fresh in
the minds of the people, it is generally believed
they will adopt like tactics, and even go so far as
to tear down bridges and roads, to impede the
progress of the evicting force, as they did on
the last occasion referred to. The exact period
over which the evictions will range has not been
decided up to the present. Colonel Turner, Di-
visional Magistrate, Mr C Roche, R.M., and
County Inspector Singleton have arrived at
Dingle to assume command over those charged
with preservation of the peace. They will start
for Ballyferriter early in the morning. A good
deal of excitement prevails in Dingle.

As a result of the Cass case, an order was
issued on Tuesday night by Sir Charles Warren
to the Metropolitan Police, directing that no
women soliciting in the streets shall be taken into
custody unless the person complaining attends at
the stationhouse and proceeds with the charge.

EXTRAORDINARY DEATH OF A CHILD.—An
inquest was held at Paddington, London, yesterday
on the body of Maggie Lukner, 15 months old,
the daughter of a carpenter at Willesden.
It appeared that the child and a three year
old sister were playing on a green before the
parents' house when some boys mischievously
pinned paper on deceased's frock and set it
on fire. The child died subsequently from burns
which resulted from the act. The jury returned
a verdict of accidental death, and the coroner
caused the two boys concerned for their
part.
