ALLEGED BREACH OF PROMISE

MOTION IN THE KING'S BENCH

In the King's Bench Division, Dublin, on Monday, before Mr. Justice Duggan, in the case of O'Brien v. O'Brien, the following case was heard.

My learned friend Mr. Justice Duggan (addressed by Mr. Thomas Kenny and Co.) moved for the order of the court to set aside the judgment of the County Court of Limerick in the case of O'Brien v. O'Brien, and to order a new trial.

The plaintiff was a woman named Mrs. O'Brien, and the defendant was a man named Mr. O'Brien. The plaintiff claimed that the defendant had seduced her, and that he had promised to marry her, but that he had broken his promise.

The defendant denied the plaintiff's claim, and stated that he had never seduced her, and that he had never promised to marry her.

The judge found in favor of the plaintiff, and ordered that the defendant should pay her damages of £100.

The defendant appealed from this judgment, and the case came before the King's Bench Division.

Mr. Justice Duggan, in giving his judgment, stated that he was of opinion that the plaintiff's claim was not proved, and that the judgment of the County Court should be set aside.

He also ordered that the costs of the appeal should be paid by the plaintiff.

Settlement Prospects

The Nationalist leaders, according to the political correspondent of the Daily Mail, have been informed that Mr. Asquith will make an important statement in the House of Commons to-morrow regarding Irish affairs. Whether the hopes of a settlement are justified or not, the settlement of the whole question by agreement will be a matter of pure speculation. Newspapers and politicians are, of course, quite busy giving circulation to rumours and expressing theories and opinions as to what is going to happen, but their statements, it would appear, are in the main little more than mere guess work based on apparent probabilities. The Cabinet met yesterday for the first time since the Prime Minister's return to London and, it is understood, discussed his report of his visit to Ireland and the conclusions at which he has arrived as to the future government of the country. As to the nature and result of the proceedings no definite information has leaked out, but the statement reached the lobby of the House later on that while the ground had been explored in preliminary conversations no actual negotiations had yet begun. The most striking and significant circumstance in connection with the whole matter is the completely altered attitude of the Tory Press. Formerly every United-Ireland paper of any note in Great Britain is to-day vigorously arguing a settlement of the Irish question on the lines of handing over to the people of Ireland themselves the management of their own affairs. In fact "Ulster" in the Conservative sense—appears to be the one and only remaining obstacle to the immediate bringing of Home Rule into operation. Referring to the remarkable change of attitude on the part of the English United-Ireland London correspondents of the Freeman's Journal says: "Their change of attitude in this regard is in fact little short of miraculous, and if only they were to translate it into language more to the liking of the people, one would be justified in taking a very sanguine view of the prospects. One hears it said in various quarters that such progress is being brought to bear, that one would need to see more evidence of its results before believing that this is being done to any adequate degree. The British United-Ireland view at the moment appears to be 'Yes, we will agree to an settlement at which the Nationalists and Orangemen arrive,' but grudgingly as this may be in itself, it hardly helps matters to long as the Orangemen with impunity. It would be a different matter if the British United-Ireland did clear one and all that they can give no further support to any Orange policy of resistance. It is said that if necessary they are prepared to do this, but nothing has transpired to show that they have done so yet. British newspapers at all events, both Liberal and Tory, have done useful work in creating an atmosphere favourable to the reception and acceptance of any sound scheme which the Prime Minister may lay before Parliament. Any settlement, however, if it is to have the remotest chance of being adopted, must be such as to satisfy and fit in with the demands and aspirations of the Irish Leader and the nation for which he speaks. It is all very well to talk of the policy of give and take in matters of the kind, but it will never do in the hammering out of this question to have all the "take" and none of the "give" on the side of "Ulster." In this connection there are some interesting comments in today's issue of the London Daily Chronicle. After referring to Mr. Bonar Law as "Ireland's Bona Fide," that journal goes on to say: "The way to deal with him at this critical juncture is to deal with him as Bona Fide, and not as a rebel, rekindling old passions and suspicions, has agreed a mingling in Ireland and in America that faith will not be kept with Mr. Bonar Law. What is needed at the moment is some clear evidence that it is being kept. And no expedient, however plausible or clever it may seem, should be seriously considered unless it thoroughly approves of it." The Chronicle remarks that amidst all the exploitation of Ulster by parties and politicians the personality and position of Mr. Bonar Law have come into view as a steady influence; and today, it adds, "he stands in the eyes of a great many Ulstermen as the one genuine reality-centre for the force of stability and progress in Ireland generally." The Times and the whole of the Northcliffe Press continue to write in a hopeful strain of the prospects of a settlement. To-day's issue of the former says: "The atmosphere last night seemed to be more favourable to a settlement of some outstanding question of Irish government than it has been at any time since the outbreak of the insurrection. The Nationalists are particularly hopeful. There may be in the breathing events behind the scenes to-day, though there will be no public announcement until the Prime Minister makes his promised statement to-morrow." It is hardly likely, however, of course it is quite possible, that the Home Rule Act will be brought into operation just now but there are on the whole some prospects for the confident belief that it is a little more workable and satisfactory way out of the present deadlock and breakdown in the Government of Ireland will be found which will be acceptable for the time being to all the parties concerned.
