PROGRESS OF THE STRUGGLE

Great Struggle Continues

The great struggle at Pozieres continues. In yesterday afternoon a report from the front

stated that, despite the stubborn resistance

of the enemy, the British gained ground,

and captured the village and some pos-

sessions. The night report states that the fight

still proceeds.

The Somme Front

The enemy on the Somme front has been re-

inforced both by infantry and guns. In conse-

quence has been showing more activity. An

attempt on the right flank of the British was

frustrated, and other infantry attempts on the

centres of the line were also crushed, with heavy

enemy casualties. South of the Somme the

French have taken a group of strongly fortified

positions.

Progress in the Caucasus

The Grand Duke is making steady progress

in the Caucasus. According to official news

from the Caucasus, the Russian army has

been successful in capturing the village of

Armenia, and the Turkish army is burning

stores, apparently preparatory to evacuation.

Austrians Kept Busy

The Austrian report gives a vivid idea of the

extraordinary activity which the Italians are

now developing on their front. Numerous

attacks were made at points along the entire

line, and the Italians claim that all these

attacks were repulsed, the intention being that

the Italians are pressing the enemy severely.

Violent Counter-Attacks

Paris, Wednesday.—The enemy in violent

counter-attacks against the British front since

the 24th have used important resources, but at

the close of yesterday had achieved no results

of importance. The assaults had already

been severely repulsed.

Huge Captures

The "Petit Parisien" says the French and

British in Picardy have captured 22,222 pri-

soners and 146 cannons.

Roumanian Frontier Inspected

Amsterdam, Wednesday.—According to a

Bucharest message the Roumanian War Sec-

retary, accompanied by two officers of high rank, left

for the frontier on Tuesday. He will

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
A Triumph of Surgery

Among the remarkably successful surgical feats which have been performed at the Highlands Red Cross Hospital, Kernal, is the proving of a 6-foot 2-inch Irishman with an artificial nose, says the *Daily Mirror*. The case was mentioned by Colonel Westmacott, when speaking at a garden fête on Saturday. The Irish soldier had the greater part of his nose torn off by a piece of shrapnel. The remains had to be removed by operation to allow of the fitting the artificial nose, which is made of aluminium.
