THE Local Government Board also wrote giving the Committee of the Workhouse for the healthy inmates of the Workhouse and requested that two copies when printed be forwarded to the Local Government Board to be instructed to draw up and submit to the Guardians scales of dietary for the sick in the Workhouse. The Committee were given the circular letter of the 3rd February, 1913.
