The Coolgreany case was then proceeded with. In all seventeen Emergency men are included in the indictment, but the first count proceeded with was that against seven defendants for manslaughter.

Mr Ryan, in opening the case for the Crown, said there was a conflict of testimony as to who fired the shot by which Kinsella lost his life. The point for the consideration of the jury would be had the Emergency men reasonable ground of fear for their own lives to justify them in firing.

Evidence was then taken.

THIS DAY.

The trial of the 7 emergency men, indicted for the manslaughter of a farmer named Kinsella at Coolgreany during an attempt to levy a distress for rent in September last, was resumed at Wicklow assizes before Mr Justice O'Brien and a special jury to-day. Additional witnesses were called by the Crown to prove that shots were fired by the emergency men without reasonable justification from the conduct of the men in the farmyard. Mr Molloy then opened the case for the defence.
