Tim Lloyd was a great hurler surely, but also a most unlucky one, for circumstances prevented him participating in the splendid Caherline County success of 1896, and more tragic still, of being one of the gallant Kilfinane band of 1897, that brought to Limerick its first All-Ireland crown.

Tim first hit the headlines as a hurler of real merit when he appeared in the Caherline colours in games against Boherard and Effin, in the spring of 1896 - both of which he assisted very materially
